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EDITORIAL

Towards the end of May, after reading an item in The Chimes, my wife and I went to Linton Village Hall to learn about defibrillators. There had been news of various installations in the magazine, but I didn't feel I knew enough about them, or how they worked. I was immensely glad I spent that time with the knowledgeable volunteers who took us through the whole procedure and actually gave us the opportunity to use the equipment - albeit on rubber bodies! – and to give proper chest pressure as part of the process. Judging from the reactions around me. I was not the only one who realised how little I knew about resuscitation and the need to act quickly and positively.

We also had some additional training with blood packs. Injuries involving wounds and severing of arteries are regrettably all too common in the countryside and applying a tourniquet or dressing can make all the difference in the short term until the first responders arrive. We need more of them in the villages, in the same way as defibrillators. Again, the training for me was an eye-opener and I am so glad I took the time to attend. If you get the chance, either to find out more or to invite a demonstration to your own group, please do so. It could be a life-saver.

It is with great sadness we report the passing of Jean Foley. Jean died on Wednesday 20 May. She had reached her 88th year on 21 March. Jean and husband John originally came from Birmingham and took up residence in Bromsash in December 1978. They soon became part of the local community. Jean was gently absorbed into village life by joining Linton WI and Gorsley School PTA and in time Jean held almost every position on the WI committee, Her culinary contributions were much enjoyed too. She also gave active support to Aston Ingham Scout Group and



Aston Ingham Cricket Club. Her activities were very wide, encompassing supporting the development of the Linton Village Hall, the Linton & District History Society, and *The Chimes* magazine. Jean became a member of the Linton Parish Council, serving with distinction as its Chair for 12 years, retiring in 2017.

Our Linton & Bromsash sub-editor John Lancaster recalls attending a Council Meeting at the Village Hall on his 70th birthday, and that it was well after 10pm when they reached 'The Alma'. He added, "How pleasant it would be now to repeat that event just one more time".




RAINFALL REPORT

May's total was 9.1mm and this was only a measly 17% of the average. With the exception of the 11th (3mm) the month was dry until the 20th. From there and for the next 8 days it was a more unsettled picture but it only delivered 6.1mm of rain. Over that initial dry period it was sunny, the third sunniest May on record for England, and warm too. The wind did

remain resolutely from a northerly direction though and, at times, this took the edge off the temperatures. It also helped to reduce any rain benefit, drying the ground even further. England had 57% of its average rainfall but there was a north/south divide with the south down to just 47%. Well we were well down again on that with our 17%. So the (met) spring: a total of 34mm of rain against an average of 159.6mm, so just 20% of what we normally see. Remember last spring though — 288mm! Records galore (again); sunniest (653.3 hours of sunshine), in fact the fourth sunniest season with only 3 previous summers beating it, and the sunniest season since 1995. Both March and April were the sunniest and May second sunniest. The warmest and, for England, the driest since 1893. Phew, that'll do. We all wanted an end to "the wet" but the pendulum has swung too far and we're now into "the dry". But the sunshine was lovely.



The Annual Parish Council Meeting was held on 28th May when Cllr Jones was re-elected as Chairman, accepting the post pending the availability of Cllr Richards later in the year when it is anticipated that he will be considered for election to the post. Cllr Jones intends to stay on as a councillor. There were no other responsibility changes.

At the meeting other decisions and discussions included:

- Agreeing terms of an ongoing Lengthsman Contract with Herefordshire Council
- Agreeing to seek agreement with the local Enviroabilty CoDoCrew to undertake work within the village.
- Concerns were aired by members of the public about a detrimental effect that the recent re-opening of The Crown Inn has had on the Village Stores business. It was anticipated that the re-opening would benefit the Village Stores, but to date the reverse is stated to be true. The particular issue relates to car parking; it is hoped that any detriment to the Village Stores business will prove to be temporary.
- Grant aid was agreed to assist the Village Hall Management Committee to fund alterations deemed necessary to enable current fire safety regulations to be met.
- It was agreed to support the Lea C of E Primary School PTA by purchasing four gazebos to replace those that failed at the end of last year.
- Plans to provide a memorial seat in memory of the late Jackie Hopkins are in hand and currently awaiting final details from Caple Forge.
- Parish Councils were invited to sign a 'Parish Charter for Herefordshire Councils'. Having considered the text of the charter, the parish council decided not to sign the document since it was considered that the Charter Reference Group (CRG) was inadequate to represent parish councils.
- The Lea Parish Council is awaiting the issue of a Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) before the planned package of 'soft traffic calming' measures is implemented in the village. These include village gateways and planters at 3 locations, buff carriageway patches with limit roundels, removal of centreline and cats eyes and the introduction of 150mm edge lining. Things remain on track for construction in the last quarter of the year.

The next meeting of The Lea Parish Council will take place on **Wednesday 23rd July** and items anticipated to be on the agenda include co-option of a councillor to replace John Roworth following his resignation, a review of all current policies to ensure that they are up to date, and to consider funding for 'Bleed Kits'.

From an ancient manor house to a modern inn

Sub-editor's note:

Since moving to The Lea I have been enjoying learning about the history of the village and its locality, so I am particularly pleased to be able to include in this edition an article written by David Mullin, who has lived in the village since 1980. David is a member of the Forest of Dean Local History Society and has had a number of articles, based on original research, published in the society's journal. He has promised further occasional articles on village history for future editions, for which I am very grateful.

His first piece is prompted by the recent reopening of The Crown Inn and tells of its long history. Angela Kirton

service rooms at the other. When these were built as cross wings, at right angles to the length of the hall, the result was an H or half H shaped floor plan, like that of The Crown.

Entirely timber framed

As part of the recent refurbishment an area of timber framed wall, facing the car park, (pictured left) has been restored. There are more exposed timbers inside. It is quite likely that as first built, probably in the fifteenth century, The Crown was entirely timber framed, using green (unseasoned) oak, with infill panels of wattle and daub. Over the

centuries the building has been altered and added to. A first floor and a fireplace and chimney stack have been inserted into the hall, which would originally have been open to the roof. The staircase is seventeenth century. Most of the external walls have been rebuilt in stone.

I don't know when The Crown became an inn, but it was before 1840. In that

year a schedule was made of land and property in The Lea. This was part of a national plan to replace tithes – church taxes payable in kind – with payments in cash. Both the schedule, and the accompanying tithe map, record that it was a public house. Many pubs have changed their names over the years but then, as now, it was The Crown.

Two manors

In 1840 it was owned by George Maynard Colchester, the largest landowner in The Lea (and several surrounding parishes). This may give a clue to the origin of the building. Medieval Lea was divided into two manors. In the late 16th century both, with all their lands and buildings, came into a single ownership. Half a century later they were bought by one of George's ancestors. It is tempting to suggest that such a fine building may have been the manor house for one of these two estates.

THE CROWN INN

The Crown is probably the oldest secular building in The Lea. From its position, on one of the historic main roads between England and South Wales, it would be easy to assume that The Crown was built as an inn and has always been a public house. But that would be a mistake. There are no early written records, but the building itself can tell us something of its history.

Open hall design

The footprint of the older parts shows that it was built as what is known as a half H shaped hall house. For much of the Middle Ages there was not much privacy,

even for the relatively well off. The houses of the landed were open halls, (partly shown here) which they shared with their families, domestic servants and others in their service. Much of the business of running their estates might also be conducted in the hall.

As time went on house plans evolved, in part to create private living space for the owner and their immediate family, and in part to separate functions, such as storing and preparing food, from the communal area. Houses were still built with a central hall, but now with private rooms added at one end and

THE FUTURE OF THE LINTON POUND: UPDATE

Roger Davies writes: Regular readers of The Chimes will be very aware that earlier this year Herefordshire Council (HC) announced its intention to demolish the old Linton Pound on safety grounds. The original deadline set by HC for the owner to come forward expired in April and the later deadline on 12th May. As we go to print, the Pound yet stands and a response is still awaited from HC regarding evidence found at HARC (Herefordshire Archives & Records Centre) that Linton Parish Council and its precursor have administered the pound for centuries. The earlier letter written by John Lancaster and signed by 70 local residents has similarly not yet had a response. It is interesting to note that Alfred Watkins published a book entitled "The Stone Crosses of Herefordshire" in 1930. Although his ideas on ley lines are now discredited by archaeologists, he was firmly of the belief that the Linton Pound was Neolithic in origin and deliberately in alignment with May Hill and Linton Church. Such is the prominent position of the Pound on Linton Hill that many are still convinced it dates from pre-history. Its potential loss today would be a travesty to our local heritage. The threat is very real. Some changes have taken place within the Pound and HC has announced the closure of the nearby footpath. If the Pound still stands by the time the July edition of The Chimes is released, we encourage readers to canvass their parish councillors to seek answers from HC. This is Linton's history in jeopardy, and it should be protected for the benefit of future generations. We very much hope that a further update will follow in the next edition of The Chimes to be published in September.





Five councillors, the clerk, the ward councillor and 11 members of the public attended the Parish Council meeting on June10th.

The minutes of the Parish Council meetings held in February, March and April 2025 were approved. A member of the public commented on a property in Phocle Green which appears to be being used as a house of multiple occupancy. Herefordshire Council has been informed and is investigating. The Ward Councillor outlined the highlights of his report. The report is on the website.

Councillors supported Hopyard Cottage's planning application for a single storey detached ancillary annexe for occupation by dependant relative, including part change of use of land to domestic garden.

The Council queried whether the development is in open countryside and if the proposed building is a proportionate size to the existing building.

The lengthsman has concentrated on grass cutting, grips and gulleys and general maintenance over the last month. Herefordshire Council have up to £4,000 available for drainage schemes in the parish over the next year. Applications need to be made by September.

Four gates have been installed on footpaths as part of the Walkers Welcome initiative. More grants will be available for footpath improvements this year. Balfour Beatty has resurfaced parts of the B4224.

All invoices were approved for payment and the Council had more than £26,000 in the bank.

All the Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) papers were ratified and the Clerk was thanked for her hard work in managing the council's finances. The dates for exercise of public rights will be from June 16 to July 25 2025.

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The next scheduled meeting is on **Tuesday July 1st**.





RECTOR'S LETTER



Dear Friends, on Saturday 5th July at 3:30 in Hereford Cathedral our curate Ewan will be ordained deacon in the Church of England. It is a wonderful service, and anyone is welcome to attend. It would be great to see people from our community at the service. There's no need to book because the cathedral is a big church. The ordination service does not happen that often and is a very special occasion. I would encourage you to come along and join in the special celebration. In the Church of England the first year of curacy is spent as a deacon. There are three orders in the Church of England: bishop, priest and deacon. I think

everybody knows what a bishop and a priest do, but we don't come across deacons that often.

In Paul's letter to Timothy he gives a good description of the qualities needed in a deacon, "Deacons must be respectable men whose word can be trusted, moderate in the amount of wine they drink with no squalid love for money. They must be conscientious believers in the mystery of the faith. They are also to be examined first and only admitted to serve as deacons if they have nothing against them. In the same way the women must be respectable, not gossips but sober and quite reliable."

In past centuries the role of deacons and deaconesses had an important ministry in the life of the church: they looked after financial affairs, and they organised the care of anyone in need. They preached the Gospel, and they assisted at baptisms and at the Eucharist. Over the centuries, as the role of bishops and priests changed and developed, the ministry of deacons almost disappeared and while it never completely vanished from the life of the church, it was seen as a temporary stage in the preparation of a candidate for the priesthood. Today, men and women may be ordained as permanent deacons. The ministry of a deacon is one of loving service, and we welcome Ewan into our community as our deacon.
