RAINFALL REPORT

April's total was 20.2mm and this was only 40% of the average. The first 11 days were dry and the first 9 of those were sunny with chilly nights sometimes enough for a frost. And the first 5 days were also quite chilly during the day due to a lively north east wind. The 10th and 11 were nice and warm though

before the high pressure moved away allowing more changeable weather to move in with cooler temperatures, cloudy periods and the months rainfall with decent falls on the 18th (8.1mm) and 22nd (7.0mm) although the 22nd itself was a lovely day. The rest of the month was dry and sunny and the month went out in a blaze of summer with daytime temperatures reaching the mid 20s. I must say that whilst this was lovely I am not a big fan as all our lovely spring flowers and blossom (and they have been exceptional this spring) don't appreciate it and start to go over far too soon. Spring should be taken gently and leave the summer temperatures to, well, summer. No cuckoo yet heard by yours truly this season as I write this up on the 2nd May.

Grateful thanks to the Parish Councillors for their commitment to the Parish

B4222 from Aston Crews to Lea

A new resident living close to the Lee junction at the A40 has written to us about a range of Highways issues affecting the stretch of road from Aston Crews. The well written notes and diagrams contained within the document are not new to the Parish Council having previously engaged in extensive work with Herefordshire Council and specifically Highways. However, we are arranging to meet with past and present parishioners who have been in contact with us, to revisit the issues and agree a fresh approach as the matters highlighted are of great concern.

Can you tell what the Parish Council is going to be discussing at a forthcoming PC meeting?

I'm guessing the answer to that question is probably 'No, not entirely'. The Agenda, posted outside the Village Hall and on the website, lists items to be covered in a forthcoming meeting. It is not intended to go into detail; intentionally, it amounts to no more than a shell. I have to admit to having felt disappointed when monthly meeting after meeting there are few to no signs of public in attendance. However, an Agenda standing alone might in part point to the reason why, because the lack of detail is in short supply. However I can explain how you might access the detail you need to stimulate your interest into getting more involved in our Parish work. There are 'Briefing Notes' which are sent to Councillors ahead of the meeting and are also intended for public consumption. These notes will demystify the meeting ahead, their detail opening the door to greater transparency, discussion of interest and perhaps attendance at our meetings.

To access the 'Briefing Notes' please do the following : 1. Log into to the Parish Council website at

- 2. Once into the front page of the website click on 'Council Business ' which can be found on the top bar in a green band
- 3. Scroll down and click on 'Parish Council Meetings'
- 4. At the bottom of this page you will find 'Notes' in blue writing near the forthcoming PC meeting date. These are the Briefing Notes. Click on the blue writing 'Notes'

I realise that not everyone has this kind of access. Internet links are not for everyone. However if I've whetted your appetite, you may have a neighbour or friend who could kindly explain what might be in those "Notes".



1930s Land Utilisation Survey — Andy Ball



he first national land utilization survey of Great Britain was started in the early 1930s under the leadership of L. Dudley Stamp who worked at the London School of Economics.

The survey recorded land cover rather than land use. Gathering of data in the field was organised at county level by volunteers, with Directors of Education often taking the role. Much of the initial survey work was undertaken by schoolchildren and students, but the data was then rigorously checked by Stamp's team.

The work was undertaken at a time of economic hardship and Stamp saw the exercise as not only of educational value but also an exercise in building citizenship. With the outbreak of World War II in 1939 the data became an important tool in the bid for Great Britain to maximise its own food production and was also later used to aid post-war planning.

Each of these categories was then further subdivided. For example, gardens were further categorised into houses with gardens, orchards and nurseries.

Whilst the surveys were conducted using Ordnance Survey 6" to a mile maps, the final data was published using 1" to a mile maps. The majority, but not all, of the

surveying was completed by the mid-1930s. However, with funding problems there were difficulties with publishing the findings. Eventually the initial project was successful in producing 135 maps covering England and Wales, and 34 maps covering part of Scotland; together with 92 written County Reports.

The map sheet (Sheet 92 - Gloucester and the Forest of Dean) covering *The Chimes* area was surveyed between 1931 and 1933 and was published in 1942.

It graphically shows the divergence of land cover in this area at that time. For example, Aston Crews, Bromsash, Phocle Green, Upton Bishop, Linton and Kilcot were characterised by a mix of arable, permanent grass, and scattered orchards. Lea had a mix of arable land and grassland, but few orchards; Aston Ingham included areas of rough hill pasture (shaded yellow). It is perhaps Gorsley that has the most distinctive land cover with by far the greatest proportion of the area being given over to orchards – shown on the map as lined purple.

Monthly reports from Herefordshire Council's Penyard Ward member, Councillor Harry Bramer, can be read on the parish council website. The main points covered by the May 2025 report include:

- At a Cabinet meeting on 1st May councillors agreed the setting up of a waste food service and a garden waste service. The food waste will be funded from central government; the Garden waste is commercial: if interested, residents can pay an annual fee for it.
- Herefordshire Council looks after many miles of Public Rights of Ways (PROW) and is investing significant sums into the network with the help of local Parish Councils and lengthsmen.
- This year the Council will be spending £10 million on resurfacing A and B roads, £1 million on C and U roads and a further £2.5 million on surface dressing C and U roads. Drainage and new ways to repair potholes are urgent considerations in the procurement of the new Public Realm contract that is out for tender currently.
- The Local Transport plan is out for consultation and can be found on this link https://consultations.herefordshire.gov.uk/consultations/article/ 127/herefordshire-local-transport-plan-2025-2041-consultation The closing date for responses is Thursday 5th June.
- There are major gas main works planned for the A49 in Hereford from Asda towards Ross, from 24 May until the end of August. As significant travel disruption is expected, please find an alternative route for your journey. Details are available on https://cadentgas.com/whats-happening-nearyou



VE DAY COMMEMORATIONS: 'LIGHTING THE BEACON WITH FLAMES OF PEACE"

THE FUTURE OF THE LINTON POUND: UPDATE

Roger Davies writes: Regular readers of *The Chimes* will be aware that earlier this year Herefordshire Council (HC) announced its intention to demolish the old Linton Pound on safety grounds. For many residents, the stone-built pound is part of Linton's heritage and it would be a matter of deep regret if demolished. By the time the June Chimes is published, the deadline set by HC for the owner of the pound to either demolish the pound or to carry out remedial work will have long expired (12th May). Action taken by HC may well have superseded the information relayed in this article. So far, the letter written by John Lancaster, and counter-signed by over 70 local residents, requesting HC either cancel or at least postpone their threatened action has only drawn an acknowledgement. We are earnestly hoping, nevertheless, to receive a detailed reply in the near future.


The Linton Pound, of course, has no formal protection despite it being listed as an historic monument by HC. In view of the site's antiquity there are no title deeds and there is no legal record of ownership. However, evidence has recently been uncovered at the Herefordshire Archive and Records Centre (HARC) that the pound has been in the care of the 19th century Linton Vestry authorities and its successor, the Linton Parish Council. This new information has been forwarded to HC. We are waiting with bated breath to hear if the council will revise its intentions in light of this discovery. All must hope for a stay of execution. This will give us time to establish whether the structure can be made safe at a realistic price. It might also enable us to arrange an archaeological survey as so little is known about the pound's past and the reasons behind its hilltop location.

A further update will follow in the July Chimes.



LINTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

(Covering Bromsash, Gorsley and Linton villages)

LINTON(SOUTH) PARISH COUNCIL

e-mail: pcclerk@lintonpc-herefordshire.gov.uk or telephone: 07763 793695. The Parish Council (PC)'s Annual Meeting (APCM) took place on 12 May. Councillor Adrian Newton was re-elected as Chair of the PC and Councillor Mike Bertenshaw was re-elected as Vice-Chair. Councillor Chris Cresswell and his wife have taken over as Public Footpath Officers (PFO) for Linton, replacing Adrian Newton and Charlotte Newton, who have stood down. Councillor Jackie Gough remains the PFO for Gorsley.

The APCM followed the Annual Parish Meeting (APM), the forum for parishioners to discuss community matters and governance and for local organisations to inform residents about their activities. Although the APM isn't a PC meeting it is moderated by the Chair of the PC, who presented a report on behalf of the council.

The reduction of traffic speed within the parish remains a priority. Councillor Bertenshaw has continued to lead on the management of the Speed Indicator Device (SID) in Bromsash. Statistics from the device continue to show that it is having a worthwhile impact in reducing speed through the village. Councillor Clark has continued to campaign tirelessly for a reduction in the speed limit through Gorsley and after many discussions with Herefordshire Council progress is being made. The SID installed on the B4221 by the Parish Council continues to have a positive impact on speed reduction albeit with some alarming exceptions where very high speeds have been recorded.

A solution to the flooding issue on the B4224 near Bromsash House was implemented by the Roads Lengthsman. Unfortunately, this has not been as successful as hoped - partly caused by the crushing of a pipe by heavy machinery and further repairs are planned in due course.

Twenty-three planning applications were considered during the year, significantly down on the numbers that were seen prior to the adoption of the Neighbourhood Development Plan.

The maintenance of Linton Quarry as a public amenity remains a priority for the council. Several working parties have met to clear vegetation and paths during the year.

After running the Recycling cafes for several years, it was decided with some reluctance that they had run their course, and they were discontinued at the end of 2024.

The council continues to maintain the allotments in Gorsley. Councillor Williams has taken the lead on this and has instigated changes to improve both the interactions with allotment holders and the general condition of the site. There are vacant plots available. If you are interested, please contact Rich Hunt e-mail: <u>pcclerk@lintonpc-herefordshire.gov.uk</u> or telephone: 07763 793695.

Finally, there were two new councillors co-opted onto the Council during the year, and one resignation. This means that there is currently one vacancy open for co-option.




