Too hot for some recently? More to come, if not this year maybe next? We are being told to expect more so what does it mean to us?

Our gardens, with regard to what we grow, may change. Some of our plants will not survive successive hot dry spells and some of those that do will require huge amounts of water being given to them. Not good when water becomes rationed. Many vegetables do not grow to their


ROB THE RAINMAN

RAINFALL REPORT


June's total was 22.1mm, this being 43% of the average. An unsettled first week, windy/breezy with bits and bobs of rain. Then clearing up before a decent 7.8mm of rain on the 12th. Following this it warmed up again into a heatwave from the 18th to the 21st, the first day of summer – good start. Then unsettled with more bits and bobs of rain and quite

breezy too. The month went out on a second heatwave from the 29th. Whilst it was another very sunny month etc. the only record set was that it was the warmest June for England on record, beating 1976 into second place.

July's total was 21.9mm, again just less than half the average (45%). The 1st was the last day of the late June heatwave and it remained largely dry for the first two weeks. Warm also and building up to — you guessed it — another heatwave from the 10th to the 13th. Then cooler, cloudy, breezy, humid with the bits and bobs of rain repeat. Dry from the 20th to 26th and then the month closed out on, whilst not a significant but more a useful, amount of rain with 13.9mm over the last five days. Up there with the warmest and sunniest etc. but not a record-breaking July.

I am sorry to pass on the news of the death of my dear husband Stephen, who passed away at the end of June. Stephen was well known in the area and very active in Aston Ingham village life until sadly the early onset of Alzheimer's Disease took its toll. We moved to Southlea, Aston Crews, at the end of 1995 and immediately felt welcomed into the community. Stephen eventually became a member of Aston Ingham Parish Council and served for a number of years until 2017 when his disease began to impact on his role. Over the years he helped out at the Village Hall and was active in a backstage role with "Asdram" for several seasons. We also opened our garden for the Aston Ingham Open Gardens for a few years and he really enjoyed showing people around the gardens but more importantly showing them his beloved rare breed livestock of which he was really proud. On one occasion he had to spend the afternoon rounding up Tamworth piglets who kept escaping into the borders, which caused much amusement for the visitors. Of course, he also was a great support to me in my role as editor of The Chimes. He would rush into the printers with the final edition on a memory stick, then collect the completed copies, help me sort them on the kitchen table and then drive around taking them to the local distributers (we are much more organised now!).

His funeral took place on 29th July at St John the Baptist, Aston Ingham and was conducted by Neil Patterson our former Rector, now Canon at Bristol Cathedral, who knew Stephen quite well. The church was full which both pleased and surprised me and was testament to how much Stephen was liked and respected. Many thanks also to the Aston Ingham WI who provided excellent catering for the Wake, it was much appreciated. I wasn't able to speak to everyone who came but would like to say thank you to you all.

Aston Ingham Parish Council News – end of July '25

Our full Agenda, backed up by detailed Briefing Notes gives a clear picture of our past month's work. It may be a timely reminder to say that the Briefing Notes are in the public domain and placed on the Parish Council website along with the agenda, three full days ahead of the meeting.

I would highly recommend reading the Briefing Notes, which contain important, detailed information on work completed as well as work ongoing, which I know that parishioners often discuss informally. Councillors come to the meeting having read the Notes and this makes for more efficient meetings.

Our Ward Councillor Harry Bramer attended the meeting and brought with him Councillor Dan Hurcumb. Having accessed the Briefing Notes Harry had perceived that Cllr Hurcumb would provide some additional and specific information to further our cause. We were able to get up to the minute information about some important new structures and appointments at Hereford Council which will aid and speed up our work. This will have a direct and positive consequence to you as parishioners, as our delivery improves further. Harry's report was published in the Notes and will also be appearing on our website shortly.

We asked about the white road markings which have appeared recently on the B4222, arousing a range of speculative thoughts. Cllr Hurcumb explained that some resurfacing is in the pipeline, but not before October. We will be informed two weeks ahead of any planned action and will convey that message to you immediately via our website.

Although there will be no Parish Council Meeting in August, three Cllrs are meeting with Terry Griffiths, our Lengthsman, to scope the Drainage Grant Application, due at the Council by the end of September. This past year has seen significant drainage work completed, some of which have waited too long for action. This is as a result of our association with a Lengthsman working alongside Balfour Beatty. We expect this improvement to continue and streamline further.



WALKING WITH THE WORLD IN THE NETHERLANDS

During the week commencing 14th July I completed the 50km route of the Vierdaagse 'Walk of the World' in Nijmegen, the Netherlands. It is a very historical challenge and now in its 107th year. It was born out of a Dutch military test of endurance, but now the number of civilians outweighs the military about 5:1. This year was my sixth time completing the walk after a long break away. The regulation distance for my age and gender is to walk 40km a day for four consecutive days. This year, however, I had to up my game if I wished to walk with Nicky Keef's son, Jack. Being young and male, his regulation distance is the 50km



route. I have always wanted to walk the longer route, and I couldn't have had better company for this extra challenge.

It is very difficult to describe the event to those who haven't experienced it. It's only walking, but 200km on roads for four days is physically hard work. It takes about 12 hours to complete each day. But is so much fun. Registration is open to 47,000 participants, about 43,000 from 80+ countries completed the challenge. The 50km route starts

at 4am (3am UK time) and from the start there are people to cheer you on. There are stretches of countryside where it is beautiful and quiet. People walk,

talk and laugh. The towns are madness; each aiming to hold the biggest and best party for the walkers and themselves. Children line the edges of the pavements either wanting 'high fives' or holding boxes of free food for the walkers to take.

On the last day, with many nursing blisters (and worse), there is a mixed feeling about finally arriving on the Via Gladiola (the gladiola is the flower of the event), which is the final few



kilometres to the finish line. Your body desperately wants to get to the end and rest, but your heart is sad that all too soon it will all be over...until next year!

I am grateful for your support and interest. I have raised £960. Some of you even opted to be part of my WhatsApp supporters' group. I loved sending out messages, photos and videos to you, I thoroughly enjoyed having you all along with me.

If any of you are feeling inspired, the Vierdaagse is a walk for everyone. At 47 years old I am the average age of all the participants! The oldest person who completed it this year was 94, I assume they were doing the shorter 30km route.

The highest award given out this year was 65, this means that someone has completed the challenge 65 times in their life!

THE LINTON POUND - AN UPDATE

For some months the historic Linton Pound has been under threat of demolition. With the agreement of Herefordshire Council, a structural engineer was recently asked to report on the condition of the Linton Pound. Whilst the external stonework is very fragile in several places, the inner core of the structure is stable and has not been affected by the works taking place on the adjacent plot. Although the owners of the neighbouring land have introduced safety fencing and stock wiring for the purpose of protecting passers-by, there remain significant safety issues. Parts of that external structure are unstable and present a real danger to people using the footpath that runs adjacent to the Pound. As the land is not owned by anyone, a legal route would need to be followed for the purpose of obtaining permission to work on it. This is a protracted process and so the unavoidable delays facing the project mean that the health and safety requirements of Herefordshire Council cannot be met. Regrettably this means the Council has made the decision to proceed to demolition /continued.

Nevertheless, all is not lost. It is intended to explore the legal options available to enable work to be done on the site. One possible vision is for a structure, inspired by the work of artists like Andy Goldsworthy, using the existing stone (which the Council has stated can be retained) - with the objective of creating a

small history garden. This would celebrate the Pound's past, with seating and a history board, permitting visitors to enjoy the outstanding views over the surrounding district and the new tree planting and landscaping being developed below from a spot also enjoyed by our Anglo-Saxon ancestors.

This has been a community effort involving local Linton residents with a deep interest in our local history and the owners of the land adjacent to the Pound who have enabled access and have been supportive of efforts to save the structure for the future. It has also involved Jesse Norman MP, our ward Councillor Harry Bramer, building professionals, council officers, parish councillors, and our local newspaper, the Gazette. Once the issues and challenges have been identified, this could become a project worthy of local celebration.






