I was delighted to see them, as there is always the fear that a fox, badger or maybe a stoat will find the nest and eat the eggs/hatchlings. I have seen evidence of this happening other years. They now have to avoid being shot when the open season begins.

RAINFALL REPORT


August's total was12.3mm — just 20% of average. Other than 1.7mm on the 4th and 0.8mm on the 11th the month was dry until the last week. This dry period was largely sunny but around the 18th onwards the wind moved round to the northeast which brought in cloud cover overnight which was sometimes slow to

clear. There was a named storm! Floris caused widespread chaos in Scotland and Northern England but we were lucky as all we had was a windy day. The 11th saw the fourth heat wave of the summer lasting until the 15th, and a very warm spell over the Bank Holiday weekend, especially the Monday. Finally high pressure gave way and a series of lows crossed the country, giving cooler temperatures and unsettled weather with bands of showers. These were a bit hit and miss but achieved a total of 9.8mm — you may have had more!

The end of the met summer and total rainfall was 56.4mm against an average of 160mm. And it was the warmest summer on record, beating that of 2018. Ross-on-Wye was at the forefront with the highest daily temperatures in the UK during the heat waves on a number of occasions such as on July 10th and 12th and August 12th.

Village News & Events Village Hall repairs

For decades, the Aston Ingham Village Hall has stood at the heart of community life, a place where memories have been made and friendships forged. From regular community events and birthday celebrations to quiz nights, music performances, and parish meetings, it has been a constant presence — welcoming, reliable, and filled with warmth. The hall has never just been a building; it has been the stage on which everyday life has unfolded, helping to bind together the people of the village.

Yet, like many well-loved spaces, time has taken its toll. Years of constant use and limited funding have started to become evident, and we have recently

discovered water damage to some of the floor joists and the piles that support them underneath the hall. Although there is no immediate risk, the problems need to be addressed before they become serious.

Never ones to shy away from a challenge, the Village Hall Committee has brought in a carpenter and a structural engineer, who have given them a quotation for remedial work. The team has now begun planning how to raise the substantial amount of money required.

The Village Hall committee has some financial reserves that they will commit to the project, and some local organisations that use the hall have also pledged to support. The Village Hall will be hosting several fundraising events over the next few months. Whether you are a regular at the Village Hall or not, we would greatly appreciate your support at these events to help raise the necessary funds.

We will, of course, keep you all updated through *The Chimes* as we progress towards our target.

Though the fabric of the hall needs attention, its spirit remains undiminished, and this work will enable it to continue serving future generations.



Thought journeys through the everyday world

Local poet Robert Choulerton has just published his third collection of poems, which is available now on the Amazon and Waterstones websites. I was very pleased to receive a copy from Bob to review, having really enjoyed reading his first two volumes, entitled 'Lines From ...' and 'Notes From Lea Bailey'.

I would define Bob's writing as poetry, though Bob himself prefers to call them prosems, not quite prose and not quite poems. The reader can decide for themselves, but whatever their title, Bob's written pieces, for me, work as poetry; they evoke delightful images, interesting ideas and emotions and unusual, imaginative and often funny, ways of seeing the everyday world, all written in eloquent and concise English.

Like Bob's first two volumes, Views From Lea Bailey covers a very diverse



range of topics, musings on the humble fly to concerns around Artificial Intelligence. He celebrates the natural behaviours and aptitudes of the animals and plants in nature, whilst lamenting the 'matricide' that the human species is inflicting on Mother Earth. Similarly, Bob celebrates the best qualities of humanity. but is quick to put down pomposity. vanity and undeserved status, all with the humility of a man who recognises his imperfections.

Several poems explore those significant events and experiences in human life: childhood, love, parenting, work, old age and death, whilst others observe and often celebrate the minutiae of everyday life, seen from surprising and unusual angles. In this volume, a few poems express the irritations many of us experience living in our modern world, such as the ubiquitous password requirements of online

shopping. But for the most part Bob's poems take an optimistic, warm hearted point of view and they indicate to me that he is a deep thinker who cares about the natural world, social fairness, morality, community and above all humanity.

Some of the most enjoyable poems to read, as a resident of The Lea, are those that celebrate the people, places and activities that nurture our community: the local parish church, which Marion keeps 'tidy and welcoming', the village hall with its coffee mornings and Gill and Nigel at the helm. The Lea Village Stores is celebrated as a real focal point of the village, where customers are welcomed with genuine warmth by Mark and Michelle, who are 'good nature

personified'. The touching poem, "Doug", celebrates the life of Bob's late neighbour, who was a 'force for good' and whose death has left an empty space in people's lives.

There is a huge richness to this collection that I can't do justice to here, but I would recommend Views From Lea Bailey to anyone who enjoys being taken on thought journeys to see the everyday world differently and to ponder interesting questions about human life and experience.


Strolling to and from the bus stop

The Daffodil bus service runs from Ross-on-Wye to Ledbury via Upton Bishop, Gorsley and Kilcot, so it is very much in our area. There are 10 'bus walks' in this book, all served by the Daffodil Line bus service. These walks give you the opportunity to leave the car behind, relax and explore our own pathways in the safe hands of experienced local drivers who welcome walkers on board.'

The walks range from 3.5 miles to 10 miles in length. Some are circular, but mostly they avoid retracing your steps to a remote car parking spot because they have been designed to start and finish at Daffodil Line bus stops. 



Seven Councillors, the clerk and five members of the public attended the Parish

Seven Councillors, the clerk and five members of the public attended the Parish Council meeting on **September 2nd**. The minutes of the PC meetings held in June, July and August were approved. No issues were raised by members of the public. There were no planning applications. The lengthsman has concentrated on grips, gulleys and general maintenance in accordance with his agreed plan. Over the last year 20 gates, four step sites and two stiles have been upgraded on village footpaths Council will apply to the Public Rights of Way Grant Funding Scheme for support for new fingerposts at Old Gore and Chibblers Hill and other footpath improvements and repairs. The Council will apply to the Drainage Grant Funding Scheme for financial support for a collapsed culvert at Mullhampton and other drainage works. UBPC will consider whether to sign up to the Charter when it is finalised. Members of the public and press were excluded from the meeting to allow a confidential employment matter to be considered.



RECTOR'S LETTER



October is the month for Harvest Thanksgiving in Herefordshire. You may be surprised to know that Harvest Thanksgiving is a more modern addition to the church's calendar than you might think. Its origins are usually traced to the adaptation in 1843 of Lammas day service by the Reverend R S Hawker, a parish priest in Cornwall. He chose the first Sunday in October to celebrate harvest as a Christian response to a largely secular harvest home celebration. Since then, many local traditions for the celebration of harvest have developed in different parts of the country. Harvest suppers are still popular in Herefordshire, and it is a good time for the community to come together.

time for the community to come together.

Harvest is a time when we thank God for his enormous generosity in providing us with the food that we need and to thank God for those who provide it. It is also a good time to think about our own Christian stewardship and giving. The average weekly giving in Hereford is £12 per week. Many people in our villages are unaware that the local churches depend on the local community for their upkeep and maintenance. Today, churches have three main sources of income. These are investments, endowments, revenue raised from fundraising and retail, but the vast majority comes from donations from parishioners.

Jesus challenged his followers to look radically at their attitude to wealth. He expected them to examine critically their patterns of saving, spending and giving. He did not challenge them to give any precise amount. Rather he asked for a much more radical discipleship — one in which people treated all they possessed as having been given to them by God. I heard a lovely story recently about the nature of that kind of discipleship which expresses itself and giving. During the collection at the service in the diocese of Mount Kenya East, in a very poor area, an egg was placed in the collection bag. It was then auctioned by the local bishop and raised ten pounds. This was not the real worth of the egg, but it was the real worth of the love and generosity that had inspired the giving from someone who could possibly not afford to give even an egg. Such is the nature of sacrificial giving and from that example comes again the question: "Are we going to serve God or money?"

I have often noticed that if people learn to be generous financially, then they become generous in other ways as well. I suspect that it is inevitable for a spirit of generosity to reflect the very nature of God himself. When we talk about our economic problems as a church, I hope we never lose sight of that spiritual challenge to be generous.

Harvest is about bringing the first fruits to God. When an Israelite offered to God the first lamb of his flock or the first sheaf of barley from his fields he was not saying "this is yours, the rest is mine." Rather it was "So much you have given me, and here I offer you the 'first fruits' of all that you have given me, in token of all that is yours." Harvest Thanksgiving is about saying thank you to God for his love and generosity. Stewardship starts with God, and His claim on the whole of our lives.
