Owls

For a month or so, owls have been making their calls during the early evening — even earlier now the clocks have changed. For the most part these seem to be Little and Tawny owls. I am not an expert in bird calls, but what wonderful sounds they make, just as the sky darkens, the air chills and all else is quiet and still.

It is amazing to be living within the bounds of this free display from nature.

I like to think I help the owls by encouraging small mammals to live in certain areas through creating a good habitat for them. It is difficult to know how helpful I am to the owls, but I do know a cat likes to hunt in the same area.

Owls are mostly nocturnal in their habits so are not often viewable. If you do see an owl, it is likely to be a Little Owl. They can be seen perched on top of posts, where they stay absolutely still and so not easy to spot.



RAINFALL REPORT


October's total was 56.6mm which was 30% below the average. The first 18 days were largely dry with a decent amount (9.1mm) on the 3rd and small amounts on the 2nd, 12th and 13th.

The first named storm of the season, Amy, was on the 4th, so we had a very windy day. Despite the dry weather, sunshine was in short supply: in fact I noted only the 5th and 6th as lovely days with most of the rest covered by the comment "dull, lots of cloud and misty at times." This was down to a prolonged period of anticyclonic gloom.

From the 19th onward only the 21st and 27th were totally dry. The 19th saw 8.5mm and the 28th 10.6mm. Daylight time for the 22nd and 24th was noted as nice. And in fact the month was the third dullest October since records began, with about 30% less sunshine than normal. That was a shame as the autumn colours were pretty good this year, when the sun did make an appearance.



Welcome to SID

If you've driven through the village recently, you've probably noticed a new addition keeping a watchful eye on our roads — SID the Speed Indicator Device.

Flashing up your speed as you pass, this clever bit of kit is here to remind everyone to take it steady through the village and keep our community safe.

SIDs installation has been a true team effort, and our thanks go to Councillors Nigel Smith, John Whatley, and Chris Yates, who have worked hand in hand with our ever reliable lengthsman Terry Griffiths to bring the project to life. Their effort means we now have not only a visible deterrent to speeding but also a powerful tool for understanding traffic trends in our area.



But the story doesn't end here. SID will record valuable data on vehicle speeds and traffic flow, helping us identify patterns and problem times. This information will inform ongoing discussions with the Speedwatch Group and West Mercia Police, ensuring any necessary action is well-informed and backed by real data.

We'll be sharing updates and findings in future Briefing Notes, and there will be opportunities to discuss them at upcoming Parish Council meetings. So, keep an eye out — both on the road and online — as we continue working together to make our village a safer place for everyone.



LOCAL HISTORY

LEA – WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Toponymy, the study of place names, is a search for origins. Many names are old, given by the first settlers and they mean, or meant, something. They have been described as 'linguistic fossils'. Language changes over time. Meanings get lost.


English place names have been studied since the eighteenth century, when antiquarians first became interested in local history. The task requires skills which

few possess, not least the ability to read medieval manuscripts and knowledge of the older languages that Norman scribes rendered into Latin.

In 1866 Judge W H Cooke proposed two alternative meanings for Herefordshire 'ley' place names: 'untilled ground' or 'a manor'. In 1916 the Reverend A T Bannister suggested 'a meadow'. Today, neither is thought to be correct.



Place name studies were put on a more secure footing with the foundation of the English Place-Name Society, in 1923. The society has, so far, published ninety-six volumes explaining the origin and meaning of place names. Gloucestershire is covered by four volumes but, as yet, there are none for Herefordshire. In the meantime, we have

the benefit of the 'Dictionary of English Place Names' by A D Mills and 'Herefordshire Place Names' by Bruce Coplestone-Crow.

Many places are first recorded in the Domesday Book, compiled in 1086 by order of William the Conqueror. So it is with The Lea, which appears as **Lecce**.

It has long been known that the Norman scribes had difficulty with those Old English words, which used sounds not present in Norman French. Perhaps this is an example. Mills suggests that 'Lecce' can be identified with the Old English 'leah', a clearing (in woodland). So too does Coplestone-Crow, who finds parallels elsewhere. It is written as 'Leche' in the midtwelfth century and as 'La Le(e)' in several thirteenth century documents, from which it comes down to us as 'The Lea'.

So far, so good, but The Lea is named 'Lacu' in a document dated 1201. Bruce Coplestone-Crow writes that this is 'erratic and presumably erroneous'. Mistake or not, it does recur, mainly in documents relating to the Forest of Dean, throughout the thirteenth century. Lacu is an Old English word for a stream. This has led to the suggestion that The Lea might be named not for a clearing in the woods but for the Rudhall Brook, which flows through the village. But, if the identification of Lecce with Leah is correct, then Lacu must be scribal error.

There is no castle at The Lea, so how did Castle End get its name? There was a castle at Eccleswall, less than a mile to the north, held by the Talbot family,

lords of one of the two medieval manors of Lea. This was the end of The Lea nearest to the castle. Perhaps the explanation is as simple as that.

And what of Lea Line? The

name has nothing to do with ley lines (discovered or invented in 1921) or the Gloucester to Hereford railway (completed in 1855), which ran through a tunnel beneath. It is much older than either. The 'Line' element is probably derived from 'hlinc', an Old English word for a ridge, so the name means something like 'the place on the ridge at Lea' and it may have been in use for a thousand years or more.

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

Herefordshire Council have approved the parish council's request to place two village gateways at the western end of Gorsley in front of the existing speed limit terminals. Gateways have proven effective in other locations in curbing road user speed.

The parish council will agree its precept application to Herefordshire Council for fiscal year 2026-27 at its meeting on Monday 10 November. A precept is the amount of money that parish councils require to conduct their essential functions and services within the community. It is collected through the Council Tax system.

Linton Pound News

The dressed stone that composed the outer skin of the Linton Pound which had been promised to the village by Herefordshire Council has disappeared. Attempts to track it down and have it brought back to Linton have so far proved unfruitful. In the meantime, an official complaint about the total destruction of the pound and the disappearance of the stone has been submitted to the council. The Ross Gazette is helpfully keeping this issue in the public eye.

In addition, Defra - the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs and the local Commons Registration Office have been approached under the auspices of the 2006 Commons Act to discuss the custodianship of the pound for the future.

Below are two photographs that show the pound in its recent state and the rubble that was left after demolition, in which scarcely a trace of the dressed stone can be seen.





UPTON BISHOP PARISH COUNCIL (UBPC)

Any parishioner can contact the UBPC at clerk@uptonbishop.gov.uk Parish Council meeting minutes are available on the Parish Council website.

Six councillors, the clerk and 12 members of the public attended the Parish Council meeting on November 4th. The minutes of the PC meeting held on September 2nd were approved. Vicky Eldridge has resigned and there is a vacancy for a councillor. No issues were raised by members of the public. Councillors supported the application to change agricultural land at Upton Court to equestrian use. They also supported the application for a butchery unit on land next to Burnt House in Foy Parish with comments that it is a new build in open countryside and querying the sufficiency of the existing splay.

Planning permission for three houses on land adjacent to Redlands has been approved by Herefordshire Council.

The lengsthman tidied up the War Memorial prior to Remembrance Sunday. The Council will apply to the Public Rights of Way Grant Funding Scheme for support for new finger posts, stiles and other footpath improvements and repairs. A replacement salt bin is needed in Tanhouse.

The Council has £31,553.10 in the bank and all invoices were approved for payment. The draft 25/26 budget will be discussed at the next meeting.

The next scheduled meeting is on Tuesday December 2nd.





RECTOR'S LETTER



I'm sure that many of you will have noticed that Christmas seems to hit the shelves on 1st November, as soon as the Halloween chocolates, pumpkins, and costumes have had their day. As someone who ends up doing their present buying at about 3.30pm on the 23rd December, I get a slight shiver up my spine when Christmas services are being planned and organised before the clocks have gone back. Of course, it pays to be organised — I tell myself this every year about 10 minutes in to my very late present shopping, as I realise that everyone else who has left it to the last minute has got there before me — but sometimes we can get so caught up in what the future

holds that we forget to focus on the present.

This week, I was reminded of the line by the poet Robert Burns that 'the best laid plans of mice and men often go astray.' I think that's even more so the case with church mice – the overwhelming majority of the work that clergy do on a day-to-day basis is responding and reacting to whatever comes your way, whether that's in person, or through an email. A lot of the time, that makes it very difficult to actually focus properly on the thing in front of you – church mice, it seems, are constantly chasing their tails.

Christmas is a time of the year where most of us are afforded the rare ability to stop much of the business of our lives, and to enjoy time spent with family and friends. It is a time of relaxation, procrastination, and probably a fair bit of intoxication. And even though Christmas is a very busy time for our churches, it is the sort of busyness that doesn't seem daunting – the carol services, midnight masses, and Christmas morning gatherings which will take place in all of our churches across this festive period are a wonderful opportunity for us all to come together, in those traditional and familiar settings, and take the chance to enjoy the here and now, rather than worry about what might be to come.

The ability and invitation to live in a state of peace, free from worry, is at the heart of the Christian message – 'do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself', Jesus tell us in Matthew's gospel. In a world that is so busy and complicated, where our attention is always draw this way and that, and we are endlessly encouraged to compare ourselves and our lives to others, it is Jesus Christ who tells us that 'my yoke is easy and my burden is light.'

So, as we prepare for a time of celebration, gathering with friends and family, of feasting and of living off turkey leftovers until New Year, I would encourage you to try to take the time to appreciate the restful and calmer parts of what can be a busy time of year. All of our churches are open during the day for you to come in and enjoy a time of peace and quiet, and details of our services and events taking place this month are printed overleaf. May I wish you all a very merry Christmas, full of peace, joy, and goodwill.
